Centre Director's Report - Jan 2008

"It's all Action for 2008"

Even by the Centre's busy standards 2008 promises to be all action, Before the spring we aim to have completed the first phase of the Devon hedge bank project, laid 500 metres of water pipe from the existing toilet block to the new cabin extension, whilst at the same time putting in electricity and a data link from the cabin back to the lake classroom. The new extension is also earmarked for completion before the start of the main fieldwork season.

The winter work programme also has to be completed. The wetland coppicing has been finished and the water returned to its normal level in time for amphibian breeding but much more needs to be done. This is where volunteers are urgently needed to help with the 'Action for Biodiversity' project which aims to recruit a small army of volunteers to help make a real difference to the conservation value of the Centre.

The Trust has now appointed Lucy Morton as the Community Officer for the project which is funded by the Heritage Lottery Fund. She is an experienced conservation manager having recently managed nine nature reserves for Devon Wildlife Trust. She has also worked for the National Trust where she managed a team of wardens and volunteers.

Interestingly, Lucy also managed the first reintroduction site for the Large Blue Butterfly. She therefore not only has the all important practical experience necessary for the post, but she also has a wealth of qualifications including a BSC(Hons) in Heritage Conservation.

Offwell Woodland & Wildlife Trust

Schools and colleges are already booking for the approaching season with the first visits starting in February. Let's hope the current run of mild weather continues!

Following the success of the Woodland Discovery Trail which uses handheld GPS computers to guide and deliver practical educational activities around the southern part of the Centre, the Trust is now working on a similar project which will greatly enhance the value of pond study for pupils. At the same time, it will provide a more effective and efficient way of delivering information about the species which are found during pond dipping.

Waterproof, handheld computers will provide information about the individual species in a way that no human being can compete with. A simple interface allows the information, in the form of narrative and images, to be accessed at the touch of a button. Close-up photography of the species shows them in a level of detail which would otherwise require a microscope. For example, the life and death struggle for survival can be shown of a damselfly with its prey or the amazing detail revealed by a highly magnified image of a Phantom larva or the miraculous event of the emergence of a dragonfly.

Using technology in this way, significantly eases the work load of the member of staff who is taking the pond dipping activities. In a busy week the same information would be repeated up to 50 times to the excited children who are clustered around their pond tray eager to find out about their own very special creatures which they have caught.
